

1:30 PM (3A)	Scots-Irish Genealogy Research George Schweitzer	History and genealogical records of the Scots-Irish, in Northern Ireland, in the American colonies, and in the early US. (Raginary Advanced)		
1:30 PM (3B)	Naturalization Records - Advanced Problem Solving John Philip Colletta	After summarizing rapidly the basics of finding an immigrant ancestor's naturalization record, this lecture focuses on more difficult cases when the basic methodology does not yield results. It discusses the various possible reasons why a record may not be found and offers alternative sources and strategies. Specific examples are examined using finding aids such as web sites and indexes. [Intermediate-Advanced]		
1:30 PM (3C)	The WWI Draft Card: Don't Do Research Without It! Tim Pinnick	Provides an introduction to the WWI registration records. Reveals to the attendees a number of valuable pieces of information that are imbedded in a registration card that

Shows how to use the WWI registration cards to help identify an ancestor with a common name and to identify relatives and their potential friends and long trm relationships using the employer and residence information. Michelle Bray Wilson, is the president of the Computer-Assisted Genealogy Group of Northern Illinois (CAGGNI) and an active member of the French-Canadian and Acadian Genealogists of Wisconsin (FCGW). She began her genealogical research in 2007 when a family history created in the 1930s came into her hands. She has since worked on-line and with other researchers to locate over 980 direct ancestors. Michelle traces her own French-Canadian ancestry to the Red Lake Falls area of Minnesota, and from there to the Montreal and lle d'Orleans areas of Quebec, to Acadia, and beyond.
