Introduction

The abstracts contain not only births, marriages, and deaths, but also information from "gossip" columns that would be helpful in searching for ancestors. This includes "visits" that include a relationship or different surname that includes the relationship. Some listings are abstracts, others in which the articles were very short include the full text. Obvious spelling errors are not corrected but followed by "[sic]". Generally, other spelling, abbreviation, capitalization, and punctuation, especially the use of, or lack of, commas, is left as in the original article. The date at the end of the listing is the date of the issue of the newspaper. The volume and number are shown at the first listing for the date. When the same information was reported in several issues, the information was only included once. When additional important information was included in a later issue, for example, out of town relatives at a funeral, the information is shown in "[]" with the issue date. The ¶ symbol in an abstract indicates the information following was in a separate article in the same issue. The newspapers are available on microfilm at Hinsdale Public Library but will not be loaned on interlibrary from there. The microfilm can be borrowed on interlibrary loan from the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library in Springfield, Illinois. Beginning with the January 3rd, 1902, issue, the paper changed its publication date to Friday instead of Saturday. Continued from The Review Vol. 38, Number 1, August 2011 issue.

Oak Forest Cemetery frequently cited in obituaries is the current Bronswood Cemetery located at 3805 North Madison Street, Oak Brook, Illinois. The name was changed from Oak Forest to Bronswood about 1910. A searchable database for the Bronswood Cemetery burial index is now available on the Oak Brook (DuPage County, Illinois) Historical Society's website at www.oakbrookhistory.com/Bronswood/. That society will also begin gradually placing photos of gravestones, where a stone exists, with each burial record.

Mr. William S. **Hinckley** died in the 74th year of his age at 7 o'clock Sunday morning, Nov. 8th, at the home of his son, W. B. Hinckley. Mr. Hinckley was born at Delhi, Delaware Co., N.Y., June 14th, 1830. He came to Illinois with his parents in 1846 settling first in Knoxville, where a brother and sister are already living, and two years later removing to Galesburg, where he remained for thirty years. In 1865 he married Miss Jessie Brewster **Farnham**, who died in 1874, leaving three children, William B., Bessie L. and Harry F. **Hinckley**. Mr. Hinckley came to Chicago in 1878 to engage in the planning-mill business with his brother, G. W. **Hinckley**, and the same year was married to Miss Maggie J. McFarland, of Galesburg, who died in Hinsdale in 1883. He brought his family to Hinsdale in November 1880. In 1885 he was married again to Mrs. Anna R. Dana, of Hinsdale whom he survived four years. He was one of a family of four brothers and two sisters, four of whom, Charles A. and Mary E. Hinckley of Galesburg, Mrs. W. P. Sisson, of Peoria, and George W. Hinckley of Hinsdale survive him, the other brother, Francis E. Hinckley, having died in New York three years ago. An impressive funeral service, conducted by Andrew M. **Brodie**, was held at the family home on First St., at 4:30 Monday afternoon. Line, now the Chicago Great Western ... The court set Friday, May 4, 1854. There have been two near hangings in DuPage county since. Merritt **Fletcher** was brought here from Kane county ... found guilty of shooting a man named **Pope**, a farmer living a short distance from Aurora. ... New trial ... penitentiary sentence of three years. Edward **Shannon**, of Belvidere was tried for the murder of his wife ... jury found him guilty and fixed the punishment at death by hanging ... February 11, 1898. ... reprieve and he was tried for insanity ... taken to asylum for criminal insane at Chester and died there two or three years ago. – Journal December 11, 1903
