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## **GENEALOGICAL INFORMATION FROM THE HINSDALE DOINGS**

## Introduction

The abstracts contain not only births, marriages, and deaths, but also information from "gossip" columns that would be helpful in searching for ancestors. This includes "visits" that include a relationship or different surname that includes the relationship. Some listings are abstracts, others in which the articles were very short include the full text. Obvious spelling errors are not corrected but followed by "[sic]". Generally, other spelling, abbreviation, capitalization, and punctuation, especially the use of, or lack of, commas, is left as in the original article. The date at the end of the listing is the date of the issue of the newspaper. The volume and number are shown at the first listing for the date. When the same information was reported in several issues, the information was only included once. When additional important information was included in a later issue, for example, out of town relatives at a funeral, the information is shown in "[]" with the issue date. The ¶ symbol in an abstract indicates the information following was in a separate article in the same issue. The newspapers are available on microfilm at Hinsdale Public Library but will not be loaned on interlibrary from there. The microfilm can be borrowed on interlibrary loan from the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library in Springfield, Illinois. Beginning with the January 3<sup>rd</sup>, 1902, issue, the paper changed its publication date to Friday instead of Saturday. Continued from The Review Vol. 38, Number 2, November 2011 issue.

Oak Forest Cemetery frequently cited in obituaries is the current Bronswood Cemetery located at 3805 North Madison Street, Oak Brook, Illinois. The name was changed from Oak Forest to Bronswood about 1910. A searchable database for the Bronswood Cemetery burial index is now available on the Oak Brook (DuPage County, Illinois) Historical Society's website at <a href="http://www.oakbrookhistory.com/Bronswood/">www.oakbrookhistory.com/Bronswood/</a> . That society will also begin gradually placing photos of gravestones, where a stone exists, with each burial record.

Escaped Iroquois Fire: ... at least twelve [Hinsdale] residents escaped unhurt from the dreadful catastrophe which overwhelmed the Iroquois Theater. Mr. and Mrs. Ruth, with two of their sons ... Mrs. Knisley and her two daughters, Miss Briggs, Miss Robinson and Miss Mortimer ... Miss Hopkins and the Misses Wentworth ... succeed in getting away though Miss Lillian was slightly injured. ¶Of the surrounding suburbs Wheaton today mourns the largest and most tragic loss of life ... eight DuPage County residents are known to have lost their lives. ... About 5 o'clock a 'phone from Chicago Homeopathetic hospital announced that Dr. C. S. Owen was at that place suffering from burns ... the doctor knew nothing of the whereabouts of the remaining eleven of his party. ... In the doctor's party were the following: Mrs. C. S. Owen and son William, Mrs. S. A. Battenfield, Mrs. Dodd and Chas. Murray, sisters and brother of Mrs. Owen, Ruth, John and Robert Battenfield, Ruth Dodd, Miss Kidwell and "Sarah" a colored nurse who accompanied Mrs. Dodd. The bodies of Mrs. C. D. Bartlett and Mrs. Adamack were found and identified by C. D. Bartlett, who is member of the board of supervisors, at Jordon's morgue. The body of Miss **Bird**, of Eola, was identified, and also that of Jas. McKee, former county treasurer, who proceeded F. E. Ayres in office. Mrs. Percy Flamilton and daughter, Hazel, ... escaped with slight injury. B. B. Boecker of Naperville, was also at the play but found his way out safely. ... As we go to press ... the bodies

The death last Monday evening of Mrs. Margaret **Sullivan** recalls the time many years past when as Maggie **Buchanan** she was teacher in the old Houghton School, Detroit. ... She was the youngest of a large family and staunch Roman Catholic. ... married Alexander **Sullivan**, a young lawyer, and came to Chicago. January 1, 1904

M. **Stephenson** at one time ran three papers ... and her brother, Frank, is with the Republican in Springfield, Missouri. January 8, 1904

To those who remember Miss May **Capron** during her long residence in Hinsdale the following account in the Freeport Daily News will be of rapt interest ... On New Year's eve, 1903, at the home of the bride's mother, in South Galena avenue, occurred the marriage of Miss Mary Louise Capron to Mr. Robert A. Hunter, of Rockford, Ills. Rev. Charles E. **Dunn** read the service. ... The bride was given away by her brother, H. S. Capron of Princeton, Ills. The first settler was Stephen J. Scott who made a hunting trip through here in August 1830, with his son and discovered the DuPage River near Plainfield and soon after settled at "the Forks". The first actual settler as the old records read was Bailey Hobson, of Orange county, Ohio. Then in July 1831, Captain Joseph Naper came from Ohio with his brother, John Naper. ... The mournful procession bearing her remains reached Hinsdale Thursday afternoon. The funeral services will be held Saturday at 2:30 from the residence. Mrs. Robbins was one of Hinsdale's own daughters having been brought up ... she was a member of the first class which graduated from the high school in 1883.
