Introduction

The abstracts contain not only births, marriages, and deaths, but also information from "gossip" columns that would be helpful in searching for ancestors. This includes "visits" that include a relationship or different surname that includes the relationship. Some listings are abstracts, others in which the articles were very short include the full text. Obvious spelling errors are not corrected but followed by "[sic]". Generally, other spelling, abbreviation, capitalization, and punctuation, especially the use of, or lack of, commas, is left as in the original article. The date at the end of the listing is the date of the issue of the newspaper. The volume and number are shown at the first listing for the date. When the same information was reported in several issues, the information was only included once. When additional important information was included in a later issue, for example, out of town relatives at a funeral, the information is shown in "[]" with the issue date. The ¶ symbol in an abstract indicates the information following was in a separate article in the same issue. The newspapers are available on microfilm at Hinsdale Public Library but will not be loaned on interlibrary from there. The microfilm can be borrowed on interlibrary loan from the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library in Springfield, Illinois.

Oak Forest Cemetery frequently cited in obituaries is the current Bronswood Cemetery located at 3805 North Madison Street, Oak Brook, Illinois. The name was changed from Oak Forest to Bronswood about 1910. A searchable database for the Bronswood Cemetery burial index is now available on the Oak Brook (DuPage County, Illinois) Historical Society's website at www.oakbrookhistory.com/Bronswood/ . No. 39*, Friday, July 1, 1904 [In Memoriam ... Norman was twenty-two years of age and had spent his life in this community. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church. ... The funeral services were held at the family residence, on the afternoon of Saturday, July the 2nd, conducted by the Rev. Harry C. **Rogers**, assisted by the Rev. David **Burrell**. The body was laid to rest by that of his father in Oak Forest Cemetery. July 8, 1904]

Mrs. Geo. **Cary** dies in California. Tidings were received Thursday of the death of Margaret Lalor **Cary**, wife of Geo. P. **Cary**, in California. It is but a few weeks since Mr. and Mrs. Cary removed to California, hoping there to find the health which the rigors of our lake climate refused to give. She leaves a baby daughter to console the bereaved husband ... Many will recall the joyful marriage of these two nearly six years ago ... Miss Lalor was one of the most popular teachers Hinsdale ever had ... July 1, 1904

Miss Rachel **Cable**, the eighteen year old daughter of F. S. **Cable**, was badly burned about the face and neck last Friday by the accident explosion of gas in the oven of their gas range. The injuries were painful but not serious July 1, 1904

Married, in New York, June 28th, 1854, Mr. Henry Kirk **Walker** to Miss Mary Lewis **Northrup**. Such was probably the notice which appeared in the New York papers that day ... Dr. **Thompson** ... officiated. ... It is not given to many to attain fifty years of wedded content, but this blessing has come to Mr. and Mrs. H. K. **Walker**, who last Tuesday celebrated their golden wedding anniversary. ... Their children are all located in Hinsdale ... Living near them are Mr. A. E. **Walker**, Mrs. John **Puetz**, Mr. H. Kirke **Walker**, Mrs. James D. B. **Murray** and Miss Maud **Walker**. The grandchildren who number nineteen ... also the family of Mr. F. E. **Walker** of Chicago, brother of the groom. ... Son of C. H. **Ross** drowned. A Colorado Springs, Colo., paper, dated June 17th, gives the following particulars of the downing of Harrell **Ross**, son of C. H. Ross. Mr. Ross is well known in Hinsdale where he formerly lived and followed the occupation of carpenter. ... Harrell **Ross**, the 13 year old son of C. H. Ross, was drowned in the old quarry at Red Rock canon yesterday morning. ... The body was removed at once to his home at 121 El Paso boulevard in Arensdale. ... The dead boy was the eldest of four children, leaving three little sisters, the youngest but two months old. July 1, 1904
